Planning

To help define your approach to this project, please write answers to the questions below

- 1. Describe what you already know about writing in your discipline.
- 2. Identify who you will interview—the time, and the place.
- 3. List at least 5 questions for your interview.
- 4. Briefly annotate your two scholarly or academic sources.
- 5. Describe (and compare) the two writing samples that you will use.
- 6. Scan Repko Chapters 3 & 4 and determine what pages will be most useful to you and your project focus.
- 7. Describe how you plan to creatively and engagingly present your discipline to the class.

Interview Etiquette

- ♦ Be prepared
- ♦ Be polite
- ♦ Be professional
 - o Greet the person with a handshake and express your gratitude for the interview.
 - o Introduce yourself and your reasons for the interview
 - Send the person a thank-you note after the interview (E-mail is acceptable.)

Teaching

- \Diamond If you share a discipline with a classmate, you may choose to present together.
- Presentations should focus on what you have learned about your discipline and particularly, about writing in your discipline.
- ♦ Length between 5-7 minutes with interactive component and discussion.
- Criteria: well-prepared, informative, engaging, interactive, organized, creative. (Please, no boring Powerpoints.)
